In an attempt to verify the existence of the e-mail(s) in question I requested the Director of the JP Electronic Information Systems, Mr. Ridley Boudreaux to provide me an archive of all of Mr. Mumprhey's e-mails from the date of this complaint back to January 1, 2009. On Monday, March the 15<sup>th</sup> access to this archive was granted to me by Robert Hew, a consultant with BBEC working at Mr. Boudreux's direction.

Upon receipt of the archives I conducted a search of all of the e-mails by using the e-mail of the complaining party. The search showed that no e-mails had been sent from or received by Mr. Mumphrey for abellsouth.net. I then set about the task of searching each and everyone of Mr. Mumphrey's e-mails for the last sixty days to see if any pornographic materials were present in any of these e-mails. The search turned up no evidence of pornographic materials.

In an effort to search further for the offending material I sent an e-mail to the address of abelianth.net and informed the user that I had been tasked with the responsibility of investigating this matter and searching for evidence of pornography in Mr. Mumphrey's e-mails. I

further informed the user that no such material had been found and asked the user if they could provide me the specific e-mail that had been sent to him or the date, time and subject matter of the offending e-mail. The user responded that I should search several years of Mr. Mumphrey's e-mails and that next time they will send them directly to the media.

The user offered no evidence or information on the specifics of the alleged pornographic e-mail. With no specific information and no cooperation from the complaintant I concluded that there was no evidence to support the allegations made by the user of the e-mail address. The sale bellsouth.net.

In conclusion, the computer specialist in the EIS Department informed me that it is easy to send out an e-mail that appears to come from someone else's e-mail account in an effort to cause conflict or confusion. This concept may explain what has occurred here.
